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What's Happening at Town Hall Second Floor?

Takavuki Morita, 1999-2000 archival intern (see photo) is back in Japan awaiting results of SHS's application to the Immigration and Naturalization Service to give him a H1-B Status Visa, allowing him to return to Sudbury, live and work here for three years with a possible three-year extension. U.S. Senator Kennedy and U.S. Representative Meehan have been very helpful and encouraging. We will know after the first of the year. In the meantime, Taka has been working on research needed to publish a history of Anjyo, a nearby Japanese town.

In short, we would like to have a collection of people's lives as told in pictures, words, or examples of what they ate, drank, used in their daily lives. Just imagine if you could open the door of George F. Moore's house (as he so wanted to do when he was away for three years during the Civil War) and walk back in time to 1863 Sudbury. One hundred years from now people will be interested to see how life was in the year 2000, when we will be "history." For those of you who missed any of SHS's programs and events, our season opened at the Goodnow Library with a three-week exhibit of works by the late internationally acclaimed Sudbury artist/illuminator E. Helene Sherman on the anniversary of her birthday in <u>September</u>. It was an impressive display of the many-faceted talents of the late Miss Sherman and was enlivened by the anecdotal presentation of Rev. Joseph Curran, long-time friend of Miss Sherman and former assistant pastor of Our Lady of Fatima, Sudbury.


Another famous local artist, watercolorist Loring Coleman shared his insights and inspirations with SHS in October. Also internationally recognized, Mr. Coleman spoke of his own life and its influence on his poignant reflections of country life as depicted in his watercolors.

In <u>November</u>, we heard a rich collection of happenings in Sudbury from the people who witnessed them or heard of them from parents or grandparents. We learned about school life, the existence of local greenhouses, the site of a Victorian railroad station on Union Avenue, and the pond and mill at Mill Village, among other things. Acquisitions:

MOORE COLLECTION RECEIVES FULL FUNDING FROM DONATIONS AND GRANTS (see photo). DISPLAY SCHEDULED FOR MARCH. As many of you know, Curator Lee Swanson recently seized the opportunity to purchase a rare collection of three years of letters between Sudbury resident and soldier George F. Moore and his family during the Civil War. The original complete collection also includes pictures and diaries. Swanson arranged for the purchase of the collection and then sent out requests for donations to cover SHS's cost, not the recommended way to do business, but under the circumstances SHS's only choice, as we were under a time deadline. We are pleased to report that more than 55 people have sent donations ranging from \$10 to \$1,000. In addition, the Sudbury Cultural Council has granted SHS \$950, and more recently the Sudbury Foundation has agreed to fund SHS an additional \$5,000 for the purchase and related expenses. Our funds have been replenished by what was truly a community effort for something that will certainly benefit the community.

The first scheduled display of the collection will be in the Goodnow Library display case during the month of March. It will show how one man's life affected so many other people, places, events, and streets, and how one bullet could have changed everything. The Sudbury Historical Society will notify contributors regarding a private viewing and detailed presentation of the Moore Collection. Thank you to all who supported this acquisition.

New Book of Sudbury's Last 100 Years Launched:



Sales and reviews of *SUDBURY: 1890-1989: 100 Years in the Life of a Town* have been very encouraging. Author Curt Garfield has completed at least four signings since October (see photo). Did You Know?

Curator Lee Swanson has researched Town records for the true history of the building that the Grange has owned and occupied since 1891 (between Presbyterian Church and Town Hall). He found that the building, begun as Center School #1, was the first school in Sudbury Center in the 18th century and had many modifications up to 1891. Information on schooling, taxes, vandalism, teacher's problems, testing of students, and even crows has been unearthed. Part of this history will be in the historical survey being completed for the Grange by preservationist consultant Sarah Chase and in a booklet for the Historic Sudbury Centre Tour project.

Thanks mostly to the efforts of former Chair of the Sudbury Historical Commission, Lyn MacLean, and State Representative Susan Pope, the restoration of the railroad section house on Rt. 20 at Mill Village is now completed. What will happen next is the big question. Ideas for a "mini-museum" of railroad memorabilia will be discussed at the next SHS Trustees' meeting. Incidentally, the Sudbury Historical Commission's 2000 Sudbury commemorative cup plates depict the same railroad section house and may be purchased at Hill's Jewelers, Concord Road, or at the Town Clerk's office, Town Hall.

Welcome New Members:
