#### Curator's Corner

Recently the SHS was surprised by donations which were coincidentally related to each other! Laura de Ford, daughter of Dr. Jean Mayer, former Sudbury resident (1967-1977), noted Nutritionist and former President of Tufts University, called and then came to SHS with her son and mother, Mrs. Betty Mayer. They delivered to SHS scrapbooks, books, papers and maps belonging to Mrs. Mayer's sister-in-law Betty Harrington (later Betty van Huysen). Betty Harrington had attended the Red Stone (Mary Lamb) School next to the Martha Mary Chapel and Wayside Inn and the Southwest School. She kept a collection of everything she could find related to the Wayside Inn and Henry Ford in addition to her own memorabilia.

Then just seven days later, Betsy Reid, a friend of Betty Harrington's husband, Dr. William van Huysen of Pittsford, NY, brought more material from Betty's collections without knowing of the previous donation from Laura de Ford. The material had somehow been divided up a while ago and now it is back together!! Betty Harrington had a very good eye and collected interesting material which I have not seen before.

As an added bonus for SHS, the widow and daughter of Dr. Jean Mayer have promised to give us pictures and other material related to their life in Sudbury. Mrs. Mayer noted that they loved Sudbury and their 10 year stay here. One never knows who will stop by SHS.

## Grinding Stone Update

Thanks to the support of our volunteers and the current owners, the SHS is preparing to install a fence around the triangular plot which holds the Native American Grinding Stone on Green Hill Rd. We are looking into getting confirmation of the exact location of the plot and then will install permanent markers on the ground.

Pictures of the Grinding Stone, the proposed fence and the proposed plaque on the site will be shown and discussed at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, June 9. SHS President Nancy Vanderslice adds, "Native American History is so important to our present culture and this is recognized by the Hall and Luis Families who have made the preservation of the Grinding Stone possible."




Antique kayak expert, Mark Starr of Mystic Seaport, CT (center) discusses George Barton's antique kayak in March, 2002


## Recent Programs SHS Has Sponsored

Once again SHS proved that there are successful programs which can be found by tapping the many resources which Sudbury has to offer!

In February, members and guests learned about the 'appropriateness' of houses in the historic districts in With maps and slides, Frank Warner Riepe, Sudbury architect and member of the Historic Districts Commission gave a very interesting presentation.

In March, the Friends of the Goodnow Library and the SHS co-sponsored the presentation of Mark Starr, antique kayak expert from Mystic Seaport, CT. Mark was delighted to get the opportunity to examine former Sudbury resident George Barton's antique kayak which Barton bought in Greenland and which is now hanging in the Goodnow Library.

In April SHS outdid itself with an marvelous display of clothing and textiles from Colonial times to the 1920's. Sheila Mackinnon coordinated the program and was aided by Betsy Gottberg, Ginny Maenpaa, Mary Ellen Hoover, Lee Swanson and Betsy Cutler who brought her family and friends in costume to enhance the program. Concord Historical Society member Barbara Forman also came in her parson's wife's outfit. Maps, Maps, Maps

### Search For Babe Ruth's Piano Continues

If you haven't read a newspaper or watched television in the last month, then you may not know about the highly publicized search for the elusive piano which Babe Ruth allegedly pushed into Willis Lake, Sudbury during a party in the winter of 1919.

SHS's Curator Lee Swanson and Town Historian Curt Garfield have also received national publicity as providers of clues to the puzzle which Kevin Kennedy is trying to solve. Kennedy began his sleuthing in the 'Bearly Read Books' shop in Sudbury where he found a copy of Garfield's *Sudbury: 1890-1989: 100 years in the Life of a Town.* On p. 46 he read "Ruth was said to have thrown an upright piano off the porch of his camp and into Willis Pond"

Kennedy thought that if he could find the piano it could be a fundraiser for the Restoration Project, a furniture refinishing program for the mentally ill in which Kennedy volunteers by teaching upholstering. Another benefit to finding the piano could be the end of the fabled "Curse of the Bambino" which many believe has prevented the Red Sox from winning the World Series since 1918 and was a result of the Red Sox's trade of Babe Ruth to the Yankees in 1920.

Divers headed up by Christopher Hugo, a research diver recommended by the state's Board of Underwater Archaeological Resources, have been using sophisticated scanning equipment on Willis Lake. Hugo is quoted in the Boston Globe(4/3/02) as saying "We're going to throw everything technology has at that lake, pro bono." So far nothing has been found that resembles a piano but the search goes on. Stay tuned.
