CHANGES

This October the Society had its 1st public Museum exhibit at the Town Hall. An Archaeology Exhibit was created with the Wayland Archaeology Group as part of the statewide Celebration of 'MASSACHUSETTS ARCHAEOLOGY WEEK'. The exhibit included the best of Wayland's artifacts, with photos of 2 of their digs. SHS displayed the entire Harry C. Rice Collection of American Indian Artifacts, for the first time in decades, plus the Smith, Hill, & Haynes Collections. Peter Noyes teachers viewed the exhibit, thanks to Jennifer Seng, and by this January over 400 students,

Teachers, aides, and chaperones will have participated in it, bringing back to their homes a new awareness of the existence of the Sudbury Historical Society, our Museum, and our programs.

Another first was the pleasure of Loaning a 1912 dress form to the Harvard Historical Society for their textile exhibit. Interns Noriko Konosu and Greg Fedynyshyn totally rebuilt and refurbished the form to display our antique dresses. It was gratifying to see hours of painstaking work rewarded by this kind of recognition.

The SHS ART LOAN PROGRAM is finally ready for local businesses, banks, libraries, etc. to borrow for 3 to 6 months an original work of art for display. All our artwork is now in our data base w/descriptions & photos. Call if you want to help spread beauty about the area.

CHALLENGES

Just as the word Curator, basically means to care for, we have a lot on our plate. The range of

responsibilities goes from the Indian Grinding Stone Site on Green Hill Road to newly acquired papers and photographs. Each object to be preserved and documented requires special materials. In order to finance the archival display and education needs, the Society needs funds. It is challenging to develop the Society's capability to request and manage funding for its activities. Meanwhile, the creation and presentation of monthly programs requires research and consultation.

Commitment to preserving and communicating the heritage of Sudbury builds bonds of community and satisfaction of accomplishment. Summer Interns

During the month of June, the Society was very fortunate to host talented and personable Noriko Konosu from Narashino Chiba, Japan, thanks to the International Internship Program which also sent the Society Takayaki Morita. Noriko quickly became immersed in American culture with her Concord Road host family, Susannah Flynn and Percy Chinoy. A very young, energetic 57 with an infectious sense of humor, she walked to Town Hall every day, and rode her bicycle for longer distances. Noriko is married with two grown children and has an art background with a special interest in textiles. Her willingness to do anything needed combined with her patience and detail-oriented skills resulted in her sewing a window blind; hand vacuuming two antique quilts; and dismantling, cleaning, polishing and re-building two antique dress forms. Because she came from a 'confectionary town', Noriko presented the Trustees and Selectmen with wonderful samples of confectionary art. Before she left Noriko sent a note of thanks to the Society members and included a very generous donation of \$1500 dollars in appreciation for what her visit meant to her. As Curator Lee Swanson said recently, "Every time we use archival materials we will remember Noriko. Why is it that people from the other side of the planet, like Noriko and Taka, come here, see the Society's needs and objectives and give so much, yet most local residents are blind to it?" We thank you for giving us the opportunity to know you, Noriko. Your visit and generosity meant a great deal to us.

Just days after Noriko left 17 year old Greg Fedynyshyn, now an LSRHS senior, called to find out if we needed an intern! Greg's many talents were apparent as he designed a web site for the Society; programmed our new computer scanner and laser printer; painted 4'x 8' panels; designed a trolley system for sliding doors; and finished Noriko's work on the 1912 antique dress form, rare because of its 18 inch waist and ankle length expandable dress. The form is now on loan to the Harvard, MA Historical Society through December. "And he cleaned up after himself!!—a really fine young man who will succeed in whatever he

chooses to do," noted Swanson.



No Stone Unturned

Although the Grinding Stone may lay quietly watching the changing of the seasons, the Keepers of the Stone have been busy since September, trying to achieve the goals set forth at the June 2002 Annual Meeting. "Celebrate Sudbury Day" brought many visitors to the SHS booth which educated the townspeople about our mission and introduced the October Archeology Week and Program. The local cable channel filmed while children and adults tried to identify Native American artifacts. Many thanks to trustees Lee Swanson and Betsy and Bob Gottberg for making the event so informative.

At October's end, the Stone proved to be the center of attention on a number of occasions. Trustee Kirsten Van Dijk was the guest speaker and presented the Grinding Stone Park design and plans to a welcoming assembly at the Wayside Inn Chapter of the D.A.R. monthly meeting. An initial push to apply for funding from the Community Preservation Committee, although highly supported by various town boards and committees, highlighted our immediate need to register the Stone on a state (and eventually) national level. These preservation tools will provide the necessary protection the Stone needs and enable a smoother path toward the ultimate creation of a Grinding Stone "Pocket Park".

We look forward to the spring thaw to install black locust fencing to replace the existing decayed cedar post and rail fencing. A new season will bring renewed efforts and progress toward our ultimate preservation goals. Kirsten Van Dijk, Chairperson, Keepers of the Stone

Celebration Day for Ralph Adams Cram

The SHS /Friends of the Goodnow Library's January Program, Sunday, January 19th at 3:00 pm at the Goodnow Library Meeting Room has been taking on a life of its own. Originally begun as a simple presentation by architect, author and Concord resident Ethan Anthony on the life and works of Sudbury's most famous architect, Ralph Adams Cram, it has evolved into part of a Celebration Day for Ralph Adams Cram. The afternoon events will begin with an Open House (12:00 - 2:30 pm) hosted by Touchstone Realty, Inc. at Cram's former residence, "Whitehall" on Concord Road next to St. Elizabeth's Church. (See picture on back of Newsletter). Currently for sale by Touchstone Properties which has meticulously restored it, 'Whitehall' is where Cram and his family spent their summers from 1911 until his death in 1942. It was extensively re-designed by Cram.

Local artists will be set up in various rooms displaying some of their works during the Open House. Guests may also view the beautiful St. Elizabeth's Chapel next to "Whitehall" which Cram designed in addition to over 600 ecclesiastical buildings world-wide, most notably St. John the Divine Cathedral in New York City. Cram is buried in the adjacent garden area coincidentally designed by Ethan Anthony for St. Elizabeth's Church.

'The Sudbury Savant' as Anthony refers to Cram, was truly a renaissance man, i.e., an architect of international fame; artist, author, musician, horticulturist, theologian, philosopher, historian, theorist, husband, father. Following the program at the library, Ethan Anthony will be taking orders for signed copies of his latest biography of Cram, "Jacob's Ladder: the Work of Ralph Adams Cram" as it is not yet available from the publisher.

Before or after the library program guests are invited to view the Cram Exhibit upstairs in the Ramp Gallery of the Library. Voluntary donations will benefit the Friends of the Goodnow Library and the Sudbury

Historical Society. This is a 'one-of-a-kind' afternoon you won't want to miss!

As a special feature related to Black History Month, Wayland resident and former National Park Service Ranger, Jane Sciacca will present a new perspective on "Slavery in Sudbury" from the standpoint of those who lived here. 
